Introduction:

- > The NT was divided into "chapters" around AD 1244.
- > NT "verse" designations were developed around AD 1555.
- > Chapter/verse divisions are *not inspired*.
- ➤ The KJV (AD 1611) adopted the chapter/verse designations which, logical or not, remain to this day.
- > To understand the structure of the Sermon on the Mount. chapter divisions should look like this:

Chapter 5 (Should be 5:1-16)

Key words: "Good works"

The teaching: "Blessings are experienced by those who keep

the *spirit* of the Law and the Prophets."

The practice: "Therefore, let your light shine..." (5:16).

Chapter 6 (Should be 5:17 – 7:12)

Key words: "The Law and the Prophets" (book ended) The teaching: "Your righteousness must surpass that of the

scribes and Pharisees. Here's how."

The practice: "Do not" do these things (lawful or not) and

instead, do these things.

- Do not think I came to abolish the Law... (5:17-20)
- *Do not* even be angry with your brother (5:21-26)
- *Do not* commit adultery in your heart (5:27-30)
- Do not make a mockery of divorce (5:31-32)
- Do not make promises you can't keep (5:33-37)
- Do not return evil for evil (return good) (5:38-42)
- Do not hate your enemies (love them instead) (5:43-48)
- Do not tithe to receive recognition from others (6:1-4)
- Do not pray to receive recognition from others (6:5-15)
- Do not fast to receive recognition from others (6:16-18)
- Do not rely on earthly treasures (6:19-24)
- Do not worry about your daily needs (6:25-34)
- *Do not* judge (_______) others (7:1-5)
- *Do not* waste this message on ______ (7:6)
