## 1 Corinthians 9 • The Privileges of Leadership

- (v.1-6) The ministry of the Gospel is more important to true ministers than even their unchallenged <u>right</u> to the most basic, personal <u>needs</u>.
- (v.7) The ministry of the Gospel warrants at least the same, basic <u>support</u> that is expected in any endeavor – not an additional <u>benefit</u> above and beyond but neither an automatic <u>reduction</u> of same.
- (v.8-11) The ministry of the Gospel may require basic, physical support, but its ministers do not expect to reap earthly rewards but look forward to greater, spiritual results.
- (v.12-14) True ministers are more concerned for the ministry of the <u>Gospel</u> than even the basic <u>privileges</u> assigned for its proponents. Nothing is allowed – neither good nor evil – to <u>hinder</u> it in the slightest.
- (v.15-18) True ministers do not look upon their responsibilities as <u>burdens</u> but instead view them as <u>blessings</u>, seeking any way possible to both <u>bless</u> and be <u>blessed</u>.
- 6. (v.19a) True ministers want no master except **Christ** alone.
- 7. (v.19b-23) True ministers of the Gospel sacrifice their own <a href="mailto:privileges">privileges</a> in order to win the <a href="mailto:lost">lost</a>.
- (v.24-27) True ministers of the Gospel are living, visible
  <u>examples</u> of the Gospel, not merely <u>messengers</u>. Spiritually
  they are examples of discipline and self-control where God's
  <u>Word and ways</u> are concerned, a personal <u>testimony</u> of the
  working of the Gospel.
